A MESSAGE FROM OUR CEO



OIC Family and Friends,

I am so excited to enter the holiday season. I hope you had a great summer! Despite all that is happening in the world, we have so much to be thankful for as communities, partners, and agency.

As humans, we have and continue to: find common ground for opposing viewpoints, find ways to address health issues, identify solutions to unforeseen challenges, and embrace extreme and swift changes. All of which can cause an enormous amount of stress and angst.

However, we continue to band together to ensure that these circumstances do not permanently impede our ability and desire to love and appreciate each other.

Furthermore, as an agency, I am pleased to communicate, that we've undergone the hardest part of our realignment as an agency. I will highlight some of the transitions and messaging.

Who We Are: OIC is an Economic Development and Career Training Agency. As one of the 30 federally designated Community Action Agencies in Washington State, we strive to increase access to education, career, and asset-building opportunities. By adopting the OIC of America Sullivan Training Network principles, we prioritize our funding and efforts on services, programs, and outcome measures that build generational wealth and reduces poverty. Our mission, vision, and values remain the same.

Who We Support: We strive to support ALL people needing assistance through our Counseling Staffing model. We conduct initial assessments to pinpoint barriers and develop Individual Success Plans to guide individuals and families through Crisis to Thriving. We apply the funding program that fits the participant's profile and needs.

Where We Support: Our commitment to our communities includes providing quality and dignifying services and care. This includes our facilities and infrastructure. We have made substantial upgrades to our facilities such as relocating our Moses Lake Office to a secure and safe campus collocated with partners.

We have upgraded several of our Yakima facilities to make them more welcoming, safe, and healthy spaces. Notable upgrades include the Supportive Services Building, the conversion of the Construction Training Facility, bathroom, upstairs updates, and parking lot asphalting at the Excel Youth Center and the Kitchen upgrades at the Henry Beauchamp Community Center. Additionally, we've upgraded our technology systems both educational systems and support software systems to increase access to secondary and career training education and efficient tracking and reporting. These tools will be deployed across our service areas in rural Central Washington.

When We Support: We are now open Monday through Friday between noon and 1:00pm and in some offices, from 7:00am to 6:00pm. Our goal is to ensure equitable access to our resources. We open on weekends for specific events and activities based on need and effectiveness.

These adjustments do not happen without conflict, confusion, or misunderstanding and because of that our administration team has assessed, reviewed, and heard concerns. And I am proud to report out that we are responding back favorably to ensure staff and our participants alike have greater access to our services in each one of our service territories. We will continue to adapt and adjust to meet the needs of our community while ensuring there are open lines of communication to hear and consider staff feedback.

We are entrusted with federal state and local resources and have made a commitment as an agency to work within our individual grant programmatic silos and move toward a whole person/family approach. We will help break the cycle of year-after-year service use. Our goal is to work with internal and external partners to transition individuals from extreme poverty and crisis to stability, to thriving, and ultimately to becoming alumni ambassadors.

I'm hopeful, by the second quarter of 2024, most of our systemic transitions will be completed, and we can focus all our efforts on providing high-level and effective programs in dignifying spaces to our community. In the meantime, please stop in and see us! We have something for everyone!

- We hosted the **School is Out, Summer is Here** event on July 13th where the community came together to have fun, engage with one another, and learn about what OIC does.
- On July 26th, OIC and 509 BIPOC-Owned Business jointly organized BIPOC Licensing Day. This event provided
 an opportunity for individuals contemplating the initiation of a business, newly established enterprises, and
 existing business owners seeking licensing or assistance. Business representatives provided free business
 counseling and assistance.
- We celebrated the ribbon-cutting ceremony to mark the reopening of our new office space collocated at the
 WorkSource Central Basin Building in Moses Lake. Furthermore, we are excited to inform you that our Support
 Services, currently based at the Hathaway Building off of Hathaway Street in Yakima, will soon be relocating to
 the former Veteran's Clinic off of Fruitvale Boulevard in Yakima. We anticipate making an official
 announcement regarding this move in the near future.
- On the 31st of July, we inaugurated our 38th Annual National Night Out event with the purpose of saying goodbye to crime and drugs in our community. The event featured a range of enjoyable activities for all attendees.
- A total of 66 individuals successfully completed their studies and were honored during the graduation ceremony on July 29th. Among these graduates, thirteen have chosen to further their education at Yakima Valley College. Additionally, Ms. Verlynn Best was awarded the 2023 Alumni Award.
- In collaboration with The Coalition to Dismantle the Doctrine of Discovery, we hosted the Indian Child Welfare
 Act (I.C.W.A) Listening Session on Tuesday, September 12th. This event provided a platform for a diverse range
 of voices and perspectives to be heard, resulting in an enlightening and inspiring dialogue. For more

ALUMNI STORY CHRISTINE

Obtaining a Driver's License is considered an integral part of the traditional youth experience, so much so that it is often taken for granted. Social media platforms are replete with images of 15-year-olds receiving their permits and embarking on Drivers' Education every month. This milestone is celebrated with great enthusiasm as it marks a significant rite of passage in American culture. This moment is bittersweet, as it is associated with the youth's aging, increased independence, and eventual departure from the family home. While this is a highly anticipated part of adolescence, it is so commonplace that we often forget that not everyone has the same experience.

Christine, a 23-year-old mother of four, radiated with joy when she passed her driving test on her third attempt. She appeared more thrilled than when she passed her first GED subject test. She revealed that she is only the second person in her family's history to obtain a driver's license. This was no ordinary driver's license; it was the first time she felt like a part of "us." This license was one of the first steps in breaking the cycle of generational poverty and marginalization. It meant that she could transport her children without the guilt or fear that comes with driving illegally. It may have been the first time she experienced the feelings of pride, satisfaction, and relief that come from perseverance. Success is a powerful motivator.
